General Costs	Estimated cost for the academic year is \$27,000, including flights, visa and health insurance. What to expect

Application process

You apply for study exchanges through SWAY. You can find out more about our <u>study</u> <u>exchange routes here</u>, and more about the <u>application process here</u>.

After applying, if you are allocated an exchange place at University of Chicago, you will be officially nominated by the International Programmes Team. We will then provide you with your detailed application instructions. You can ONLY apply to any exchange destination if you have been allocated a place there, and if you are officially nominated by us.

Academics

For support with the academic side of your exchange, your best point of contact is your Exchange Coordinator, <u>found here</u>. The Exchange Coordinator is a member of academic staff who will be a key contact throughout your exchange.

Course Load and Credit Load	You are normally required to take whatever constitutes a full academic credit or course load at your host university.

Courses	Please refer to areas of study and the Course Catalogue for details on available courses. The University of Chicago uses the quarter system consisting of ten weeks of classes followed by a reading week and then final examinations. Please refer to the academic calendar.
	The curriculum is divided into compulsory interdisciplinary classes (The Core), classes relevant to their major and minor, and a range of elective courses. The curriculum will vary for exchange students, and you will have more information specific to your degree program upon applying.
	Please be aware, there may not be an up-to-date course catalogue available at this exchange destination. Please use the information available to get an idea about what you can study while on exchange

A word of caution for students interested in studying Academic economics: Economics at UChicago is closely taught with Restrictions mathematics. Virtually all Econ courses are highly quantitative, and even the introductory courses of Econ sequences require that students have strong background in calculus. Upper-level offerings in the Econ major often require that students finish part of the introductory economics sequence along with a full year of calculus. Econ majors are also required to take two additional mathematics courses beyond calculus (mathematics is not the equivalent of calculus at UChicago). Students, whose transcripts lack a full year of calculus, may not be able to enrol in economics courses - except for introductory micro and macro classes that dispense with the calculus prerequisite – during their study at UChicago. Students, therefore, should come prepared to take classes in other disciplines besides economics. **Please note:** These are guidelines. It is **your** responsibility to research whether the partner provides appropriate courses for your degree programme. Even if there are not restrictions on your degree subject, it does not mean that there are appropriate courses for you. Please check. Orientation International Pre-Orientation (IPO) provides a platform for students from around the world to ease into their transition into the University of Chicago. This five-day event allows incoming students the opportunity to explore campus, the neighbourhood of Hyde Park, and the city of Chicago while making friends and getting to know upper-class students in the College, all before Orientation even begins

Accommodation

Finding accommodation that you are happy with on your year abroad is very important and there are often many aspects to consider when looking for somewhere to live.

Many host institutions do offer university accommodation but please do note, **this is not always guaranteed.** You may also need to pay for things like agent or administrative fees that is not always the case here in Edinburgh. It is a good idea to do your research so you do not have any surprises!

University Accommodation

Costs

It is important to budget for different expenses while on exchange. Your exchange destination may be more expensive than Edinburgh, and different expenses may be required. For example, rent may be higher; you might need to take public transport more; essentials may be more expensive or different, like sun cream in warmer climates or woolly socks in colder climates! These costs will add up so it is good to have an estimate of how much money you might need.

Tuition Fees	While on exchange, you will continue to pay fees to the University of Edinburgh, as appropriate, and your fee status will determine how much you pay. Consult our webpage here and follow the link to consult the university's information on tuition fees for students studying abroad.

	You may also be required to pay for administrative fees at your host institution. This can include paying for your transcript to be sent to us at the end of your exchange.
Insurance	Insurance is required for students but can be waived if the student has their own comparable insurance.

Student Loans and Grants

If you receive a student loan or grant, you may still be eligible to receive them during your exchange. Contact your funding providers for more information on the availability and eligibility of funding during your exchange, as well as any additional support they may offer. For example: some loan providers offer travel grants to students.

Other

Passports	Make sure that your passport will be in date for the entirety of your stay, and for any additional required time after the end of your exchange for entry requirements and visa purposes. If you need to apply for a new passport during the application process to your host institution, this may delay the application and visa processes.
Visas	The visa process will vary from country to country, and your own citizenship will influence the visa process you need to undertake. You must make sure to enter your host country on the appropriate visa. If you have any questions about visas please do not hesitate to contact UChicago's office at international-affairs@uchicago.edu . Here in SWAY we cannot give specific visa advice. Please research using the relevant embassy and government websites for more information. There is more information on our webpage about things to consider regarding visas here . Once you have received an offer from a host institution, you will be given more advice from them about the visa processes.
Employment	Eligible to work up to 20 hours a week on campus with a J-1 visa.
Disability Statement and Accessibility	Some destinations may be more accessible than others for disabled students. If you require any adjustments due to disability or specific learning difficulties or disabilities and you wish to study abroad please contact The International Programmes Team via
