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About the University	Founded in 1853, the University of Melbourne is a public- spirited institution that makes distinctive contributions to society in research, learning and teaching and engagement. It is consistently ranked among the leading universities in the world, with international rankings of world universities placing it as number 1 in Australia and number 32 in the world (Times Higher Education World University Rankings 2020).
	The University is like a self-contained village, with its own theatres, art galleries, book shop, sports facilities, sushi bar, coffee lounges, shops, banks, post office, travel agents etc. The inner-city suburb of Carlton, full of shops, cafes and restaurants, is right next door to the main campus. A five minute tram ride will take you to the heart of downtown Melbourne.
	With 38% of the population born overseas and 140 cultures represented, Melbourne is extremely multi- cultural and welcoming of people from all backgrounds. With almost all food cuisines catered for, Melbourne's food scene is world class, and boasts more coffee shops per capita than any other city in the world! It is also a safe, fun city.

### What to expect

#### **Application process**

You apply for study exchanges through SWAY. You can find out more about our <u>study exchange routes here</u>, and more about the <u>application process here</u>.

After applying, if you are allocated an exchange place at the University of Melbourne, you will be officially nominated by the International Programmes Team. We will then provide you with your detailed application instructions. You can ONLY apply to any exchange destination if you have been allocated a place there, and if you are officially nominated by us.

#### Academics

For support with the academic side of your exchange, your best point of contact is your Exchange Coordinator, <u>found here</u>. The Exchange Coordinator is a member of academic staff who will be a key contact throughout your exchange.

Course Load and Credit Load	You are normally <b>required</b> to take whatever constitutes a full academic credit or course load at your host university.

Academic Restrictions	There may be academic restrictions on certain courses. Orientation	The University of Melbourne runs an orientation programme for all students starting study or exchange abroad. Attending the Welcome Day is <b>compulsory</b> , and is normally held on the Friday before orientation week each semester. You can find out more information about the welcome day <u>here</u> . Late arrivals and non-attendance can only be approved in extenuating circumstances.

#### Accommodation

Finding accommodation that you are happy with on your year abroad is very important and there are often many aspects to consider when looking for somewhere to live. Many host institutions do offer university accommodation but please do note, **this is not always guaranteed.** You may also need to pay for things like agent or administrative fees that is not always the case here in Edinburgh. It is a good idea to do your research so you do not have any surprises!

University Accommodation	The University of Melbourne offers a range of accommodation options. However, please do apply early as it is a competitive process. Once you have submitted an online application, you can begin applying for housing using your UniMelb Student Number. 	The University of Melbourne also has its own <u>residential colleges</u> . University colleges offer an immersive campus lifestyles with academic support, meals and other cultural, social and sporting activities. Living in eligible University Accommodation provides full membership to the <u>Residential Life Program</u> . The program helps you adjust to and get the most out of campus life with guidance from our dedicated staff as well as a year-round calendar of

	activities to assist you with your academic, social, cultural, wellbeing and career needs. The university is also affiliated with another nine <u>external</u> <u>residential colleges</u> , and partner accommodation such as <u>UniLodge Lincoln House</u> and <u>Student Village Accommodation</u>
Private Accommodation	Looking for private rental accommodation is also an option while in Melbourne. You can find out more information <u>here</u> . The <u>Off-Campus Housing Network</u> is also a peer-to-peer information exchange platform to support students at the university to find private off-campus accommodation.

#### Costs

It is important to budget for different expenses while on exchange. Your exchange destination may be more expensive than Edinburgh, and different expenses may be required. For example, rent may be higher; you might need to take public transport more; essentials may be more expensive or different, like sun cream in warmer climates or woolly socks in colder climates! These costs will add up so it is good to have an estimate of how much money you might need.

#### Other

Passports	Make sure that your passport will be in date for the entirety of your stay, and for any additional required time after the end of your exchange for entry requirements and visa purposes. If you need to apply for a new passport during the application process to your host institution, this may delay the application and visa processes.
Visas	The visa process will vary from country to country, and your own citizenship will influence the visa process you need to undertake. You must make sure to enter your host country on the appropriate visa. Students coming from overseas to study at the University of Melbourne (who are not Australian or New Zealand citizens) must have a valid visa to enter Australia, as explained here. Most students studying in Australia will need a valid Subclass 500 student visa. Please do verify this on the Australian Home Affairs website here, using their visa finder here. Students <b>must</b> obtain their <u>student visa</u> before arriving in Australia. Your host will provide a Confirmation of Enrolment (CoE) form with their Acceptance letter. This is needed in your visa application. When applying for a student visa, you must meet the <u>Genuine</u> <u>Temporary Entrant criteria</u> and have sufficient funds to pay your living costs for the duration of your studies. You must check visa and immigration laws, as well as rules about entering and leaving Australia, and required vaccinations. Here in SWAY we cannot give specific visa advice. Please research using the relevant embassy and government websites for more information. There is more information on our webpage about things to consider regarding visas <u>here</u> . Once you have received an offer from a host institution, you will be given more advice from them about the visa processes.

Employment	Students should not depend on earnings from part-time work to meet their living expenses while in Australia. Please do verify whether you are able to work while in Australia on your appropriate visa. Be sure to look into any limitations on your work, if you are able to work. The advice from the University of Melbourne about finding work can be found <u>here</u> .
Disability Statement and Accessibility	Some destinations may be more accessible than others for disabled students.
