What to expect

Application process

You apply for study exchanges through SWAY. You can find out more about our study exchange routes here, and more about the application process here.

After applying, if you are allocated an exchange place at the University of Queensland you will be officially nominated by the International Programmes Team. We will then provide you with your detailed application instructions. You can ONLY apply to any exchange destination if you have been allocated a place there, and if you are officially nominated by us.

Academics

For support with the academic side of your exchange, your best point of contact is your Exchange Coordinator, <u>found here</u>. The Exchange Coordinator is a member of academic staff who will be a key contact throughout your exchange.

Course Load and Credit Load You are normally required to take whatever constitutes a full academic credit or course load at your host university. enrolment, using the library, learning assistance, and living and travelling in Australia, so you hit the ground running!

Accommodation

Finding accommodation that you are happy with on your year abroad is very important and there are often many aspects to consider when looking for somewhere to live. Many host institutions do offer university accommodation but please do note, **this is not always guaranteed.** You may also need to pay for things like agent or administrative fees that is not always the case here in Edinburgh. It is a good idea to do your research so you do not have any surprises!

University Accommodation

The University of Queensland offers many different types of accommodation for their students. The on-campus options include residences, residences, halls of residences and houses. Each option has their own features so do look into the differences to decide which would be best for you!

If you want to arrange your accommodation ahead of time, have your meals catered, and lots of support and activities at your fingertips, consider living at one of the ten colleges at UQ St Lucia or the Gatton Halls of Residence. Spaces at the Colleges are limited and in high demand. Apply early to avoid disappointment.

If you want to be a little more independent but still have your accommodation arranged before you arrive, consider living in off-campus student housing. This is furnished, self-catered accommodation that is designed for students that can be booked online. Approved providers are listed on the website linked above.

Private Accommodation

Another option while on exchange is to live in <u>private</u> accommodation off campus while you are in Brisbane.

The University of Queensland has <u>online resources available</u> to UQ students, staff, and partners to assist them in finding accommodation during their time at The University. The platform connects these prospective Tenants to Providers with vacant properties and rooms close to their campuses.

Properties are sourced from a wide variety of Providers, including private landlords, real estate agencies, and commercial accommodation providers.

Costs

It is important to budget for different expenses while on exchange. Your exchange destination may be more expensive than Edinburgh, and different expenses may be required. For example, rent may be higher; you might need to take public transport more; essentials may be more expensive or different, like sun cream in warmer climates or woolly socks in colder climates! These costs will add up so it is good to have an estimate of how much money you might need.

Tuition Fees

While on exchange, you will continue to pay fees to the University of Edinburgh, as appropriate, and your fee status will determine how much you pay.

Estimated Cost of Living

Brisbane is one of Australia's cheapest major cities for students to live in, and careful budgeting will help your money go further.

UQ has created a <u>guide to estimated living expenses</u> for a student in Brisbane. This list can give you a better understanding of everyday costs in Brisbane. **Note:** This does not include visa, insurance or flight costs

As set out by the <u>Department of Home Affairs</u>, a single student must be able to show the financial capacity to cover living costs of at least \$21,041 Australian dollars per year – this works out at \$1,754 per month for accommodation, food, utilities and entertainment. The actual costs will depend on your lifestyle choices and needs.

The Australian government website MoneySmart has lots of information and advice about a range of financial issues, including a section specifically for students on how to live on student budget. They have also created an 'Education and living costs in Australia' webpage for more advice on the cost of living while studying in Australia.

You may also be required to pay for administrative fees at your host institution. This can include paying for your transcript to be sent to us at the end of your exchange.

Insurance	Overseas Student Health Cover (OSHC) provides international students with basic cover for medical and hospital care costs while in Australia. OSHC is a compulsory requirement for a student visa. The University of Queensland can organise OSHC for you through its preferred provider.
Student Loans and Grants	Consult our <u>funding webpages</u> for more information about the Funding available to you through SWAY while on your year abroad. If you receive a student loan or grant, you may still be eligible to receive them during your exchange. Contact your funding providers for more information on the availability and eligibility of funding during your exchange, as well as any additional support they may offer. For example: some loan providers offer travel grants to students.

Other

Passports	Make sure that your passport will be in date for the entirety of your stay, and for any additional required time after the end of your exchange for entry requirements and visa purposes.
	If you need to apply for a new passport during the application process to your host institution, this may delay the application and visa processes.
Visas	The visa process will vary from country to country, and your own citizenship will influence the visa process you need to undertake. You must make sure to enter your host country on the appropriate visa.
	All international students applying to study in Australia must have a student visa unless they have an alternative visa that enables them to study full-time.
	Most students studying in Australia will need a valid Subclass 500 student visa. Please do verify this on the Australian Home Affairs

website <u>here</u>, using their visa finder <u>here</u>. Students **must** obtain their <u>student visa</u> before arriving in Australia. Your host will provide a Confirmation of Enrolment (CoE) form with their Acceptance letter. This is needed in your visa application.

When applying for a student visa, you must meet the <u>Genuine</u> <u>Temporary Entrant criteria</u> and have sufficient funds to pay your living costs for the duration of your studies.

You must check visa and immigration laws, as well as rules about entering and leaving Australia, and required vaccinations.

Students who are citizens of certain countries may be required to provide additional proof of genuine temporary entrant status when they apply to UQ. In some cases, they may be requested to apply through an agent.

Here in SWAY we cannot give specific visa advice. Please research using the relevant embassy and government websites for more information. There is more information on our webpage about things to consider regarding visas here.

Once you have received an offer from a host institution, you will be given more advice from them about the visa processes.

Employment

Most student visa should allow you to work up to 40 hours every two weeks. Please do verify this with the conditions your own visa in case this varies.

You can also <u>enhance your employability</u> and gain experience during your time at UQ through volunteering, mentoring, research or leadership programs. You also have access to a range of free careers seminars and workshops to help you make industry connections, or provide advice on your resume or feedback on interview techniques.

Disability Statement and Accessibility
