Application Process	If you are successfully allocated a space at this institution, SWAY will formally nominate you. TU Berlin will then provide you with instructions on their application process.

Living

Estimated Cost of Living	Housing: Between €400-600 Food/Drink: approx. €250 Books: €30 (depending on the field of study) Public transportation("Semesterticket") is included in the semester contribution of about €260 payable once per semester. Please note that the figures represent a rough estimate provided by TU Berlin.
Accommodation	Dormitory for Exchange (tu.berlin)
Insurance	Exchange students have to register with a German statutory health insurer or get private health insurance and apply for a waiver of the statutory health insurance requirement upon arrival in Berlin. It is highly recommended for all EU citizens to obtain the European Health Insurance Card (EHIC) or Global Health Insurance Card (GHIC) before their arrival.
Visas	Students should contact the relevant consulate / embassy to check if they will require a visa and a residence permit to study in Germany.
Disability	Some destinations may be more accessible than others for students with disabilities. If you require any adjustments due to a disability or specific learning difficulty and you wish to study abroad, there will be an opportunity to disclose this during the application process.
